A few weeks ago...... the question was posed......

What does the washing of the feet say about the Eucharist?

I was very heartened to receive your replies.

Here are some of the responses that came from you. Well worth reflecting on as this weekend we concentrate on how **Eucharist leads to Service**

Thank you from Fr Pete

I've always felt that the Eucharist was mainly for my own personal, purification and salvation..... And that receiving it was the end goal.

I've not really before until now, contemplated it being the beginning of something.... Of the beginning of ministry to others... which now seems so obvious to me when I think of it's place in the Gospel.

Jesus washed the feet of the disciples after the meal. He did

this to make it clear to his followers about the need to love one another. This gives purpose and meaning in life as I am fed by the Eucharist. Instead of thinking "what now". Jesus example to love and serve others shows that I must love and care for others. It is made real now by the Holy Spirit, Jesus sent to us. The presence of God, Jesus is present always.

The washing of the feet says that the Eucharist is about empowering us to simple, humble action in service of others...

Action that is mutually Mana enhancing

The Eucharist is not Love as a thought... It's Love in action

Servant Leadership Reversal of Roles

Intimacy. Getting close to those we are with + whom we serve

Of the feet The Eucharist is not just for I, me and myself! It becomes whole through service of others

The Eucharist is not a sign of Elitism or exclusivity. It's about a deep and authentic humility (which asks us some serious questions about how we live our lives after receiving it!!)

Washing of the feet ←→ Eucharist

By washing the feet of his disciples, Jesus gave us the example of how we are to love and serve each other. We are given the strength to persevere in loving and serving God, and loving and serving all we meet every day, by receiving the <u>real</u> Body and Blood of Christ in Holy Communion, Food for the journey, and each and every one of us. (Eucharist)

We receive Holy Communion and we then go to "wash the feet" of all we meet.

Dear Fr Peter

Thanks for the opportunity to comment on Victor Frankl's "Men's search for meaning"

My 46 year old daughter found your leaflet struck the right note for her, particularly the quote about the necessity for a reflective space between stimulus and response.

She considers the washing of the feet at the Lord's last supper highlights the need to serve others before ourselves. Frankl's positive impact on other prisoners in Dachau shows the need to confront the inevitable suffering on our life's journey with the cross of Jesus which we must pick up to follow him.

For me the Eucharist is about being nourished.

Eucharist is about food for the journey.

When I participate in the Eucharistic meal I am nourished by love

I am united intimately with others at the table....

And then nourished and energised by love. I go out and serve by washing the feet of others...

And in the spirit of Love I can be a channel of Love to others.

I think washing the feet is getting them clean and the dust of the journey off. It is also humbling to have another person wash your feet which also leads to servitude serving the other person. This should work by then going out and serving others in the name of Eucharist

I did not see what Christ washing the feet of the disciples had to do with the Eucharist. After reflection I thought the following may apply.

Washing the feet is a humble act of servitude which would, no doubt, have been done by the lowest servant girl/boy. Christ often is quoted as saying "I came to serve, not to be served" and "the greatest among you must be the servant of all".

When we receive the Eucharist we respond to the words "Body of Christ" with "Amen". This Amen is us saying "yes, I will be the body of Christ" in the world today. God has no arms, no legs but ours and as we say Amen when receiving the Eucharist we are making a commitment to serve

The Washing of the Feet

Quote from an elderly Malvina Major Chapel community member:

"We are to Love and serve the Lord and each other"

Washing of the feet - to Eucharist means to me Take a moment and reach outside yourself.

When he washed the feet of the apostles Jesus indicated his desire to serve them.

So we go forth from the Mass to serve the Parish and community. Yes, we DO this AND Yes we could DO MORE.

If, and when there are no, or relatively few priests, this Parish is perfectly capable of getting on and continuing to function effectively.

So I think it is a fine balance between what we implement now and what we leave till it is absolutely necessary and I honestly believe that there are some things for which we cannot prepare but TRUSTING IN THE LORD he will see us through.

Washing the feet—Eucharist

Do you want a McDonald's Mass? Or slow Sunday to Sunday top up roast?

I feel sad when so many people miss out on "only once a month" morning tea.

Also sad when people I recognise from Church don't smile or acknowledge you in a different setting. The fast life has taken over.

BUT, if the people who don't stay for a cuppa and the people in the fast lane have serious issues with family, work etc, and are giving them their all, then all of the above should be deleted, in a moment of contemplation. (Frankl) They are washing the feet.

Thank you for the Frankl quote—very helpful.

Personally, an extension of the Eucharist to me is being with those you love including fellow parishioners.
